Now it is your turn!

Last week you designed your car on paper. You should have been collecting some materials.

You need 2 sticks for your axles or something similar and some things for wheels. You need at least one box or bottle. You may have collected more things to use. One of the above cars taped pieces of straw to the model and then put the stick through the straw so that it could turn freely.

If you haven't got strong glue to hold the stick in place then you could use a piece of blutak or even plasticene.

You may need help from an adult to make a hole in the wheels. One way of doing it is to gently hammer a nail through the wheel and then take the nail out again.

This week you are going to make your car. It can be very simple or more complicated - it is up to you! Remember that you want Toad from Wind in the Willows to buy it!

You may need to adapt it as you go along. If you haven't got the materials that you originally wanted it to be made from then you may need to change your ideas and that is fine.

Part of designing things is to be able to adapt and you may have better ideas than you did a week ago.

Think about how you fix it together and whether you want to decorate it or paint it when you have built it.

How you fix it together will depend on what you have at home so we don't mind. Do the best that you can with what you have.


Have fun and use your designs, your research and your imagination. Do not worry how it turns out. The important thing is to do your best.


