English

The activity today is to write an Epilogue.

An Epilogue is the conclusion to the story which tells of what becomes of the characters.

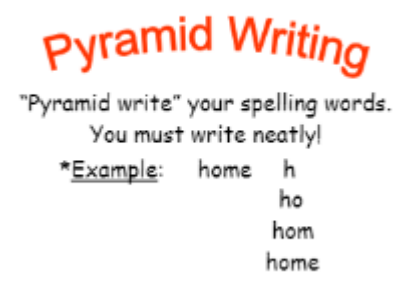
For example: How does Mole feel before visiting Badger's home in the Wild Woods?

Mild – First three columns of the Missing Epilogue. Hot/ Spicy – All four columns.

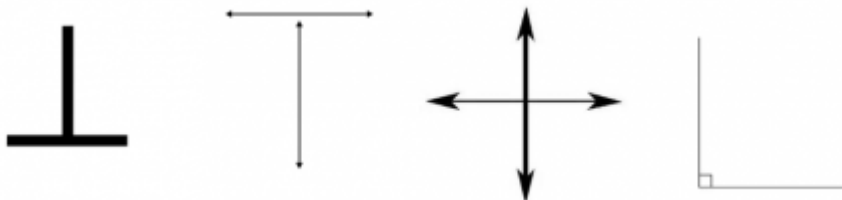
Parallel lines are straight lines that **always stay the same distance from each other** and never meet:



Perpendicular lines

When two lines are perpendicular, they are at right angles to each other.

All of these diagrams show pairs of lines that are perpendicular to each other.
