The activity today is to write an Epilogue.

An Epilogue is the conclusion to the story which tells of what becomes of the characters.

What do you think Mole might think of the animals and where they live now when he visits them? You have just finished reading Wind in the Willows so you know how it has ended. Imagine the final pages had been torn out of the book you had been given by your teacher.

Look back through your home learning on all the past chapters of Wind in the Willows to help you with today's task and then complete the table 'The Missing Epilogue' in preparation for writing 'The missing epilogue' tomorrow.

<u>For example: How does Mole feel before visiting Badger's home in the Wild Woods?</u> Mole felt much more obliged to visit Badger's home in the wild woods and didn't mind the damp passages of Badger's underground Tree home any more. He was not scared of the Wild wood anymore and muttered "Those Silly Weasels and Stoats!" Before entering the Wild Wood.

Mild – First three columns of the Missing Epilogue. Hot/ Spicy – All four columns. SPaG



Parallel lines are straight lines that always stay the same distance from each other and never meet:



Perpendicular lines

When two lines are perpendicular, they are at right angles to each other. All of these diagrams show pairs of lines that are perpendicular to each other.
