Drawing (Portraits)

Artist: Hans Holbein (1497-1543)



Key Vocabulary:

Shading – using pencil lines to create depth and texture

Outline – the shapes of parts of a drawing

Proportion – the size of parts of a painting in relation to height, width and depth

Emblem – a distinctive badge of a nation, organisation, or family.



Printing

Artist: Andy Warhol (1928-1987)

Texture – how parts of a picture feel

Pattern – to decorate with a repeated design



History

Henry VIII (1491-1547)

King of England 1509-1547

Married 6 times- Catherine of Aragon, Anne Boleyn, Jane Seymour, Anne of Cleves, Catherine Howard, Catherine Parr
"Divorced, Beheaded, Died, Divorced, Beheaded, Died"

Anne Boleyn (about 1507-1536) Queen of England 1533-1536

1501 or 1507 – born Hever Castle

1532 – marriage to King Henry VIII

1533 – daughter Elizabeth I is born

1536 – arrested and executed for treason.

Queen of England 1558-1603

Never married

Monarch/Ruler – a person who reigns over a kingdom or empire.

Empire – a group of territories ruled by one person

King – Male monarch/ruler

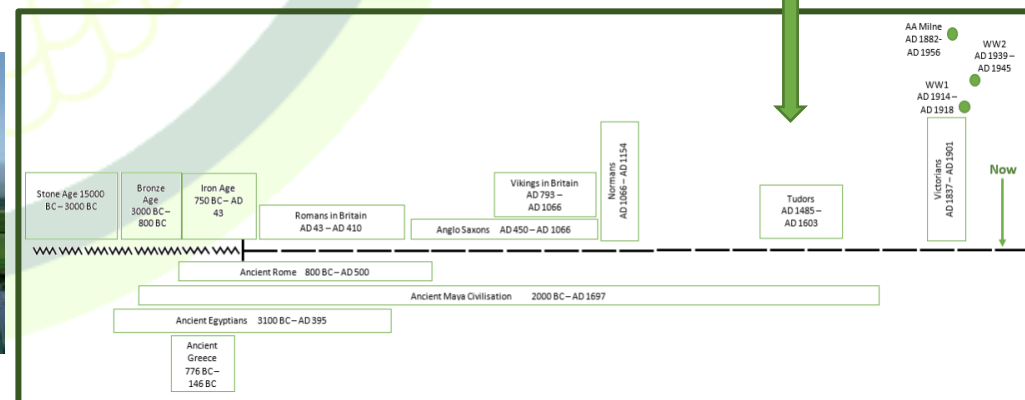
Queen – Female monarch/ruler

Source – someone or something that provides information





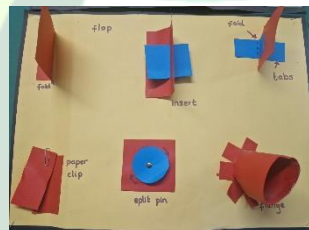
