Dear parents,

As you will have heard, we now have a class isolating at home which is a reminder that COVID is still present and still impacting the community. Year 5 11+ test registration

Registration is now open for parents to register their Year 5 children for the 11+ tests. We now have the results from the CAT tests which teachers will be sharing with you shortly, and teachers will be available for you to meet on the 24th June to talk them through. More details to follow.

You register for the tests via the KCC website (see below) and registration closes on 1st July. As I said before, my advice is to register if you have any inkling that you may wish your child to take the tests. After this date it will be too late. You can always change your mind after you have completed the registration.

Please ensure you choose the correct St James' from the list and check that you have received an email confirmation. If you do not receive an email, call the KCC admissions helpline to check your registration was processed correctly. Again, after the 1st July it may be too late to do anything.
