A newsletter? On a Monday? At this hour?!

Again, apologies for the delay, but on the plus side, this has given us the chance to add even more newsworthy items than ever before. In years to come, tales will be told and passed down from generation to generation of the school newsletter that had a bit more content than most of the others, but (if we're honest) perhaps a bit less than a few of them. This is how legends are born.

I want to start with a brief mention of the weather forecasting service. Over the years, this has developed in complexity to the point where, using satellites, advanced computer modelling and a dash of artistic license, we can predict the following day's weather with reasonable accuracy.

Imagine my surprise therefore when children emerged onto a rain lashed playground last week (as accurately forecast) with no coat, and then asserted that as it was hot yesterday, they decided not to bring a coat. After a number of brief conversations with junior children, it quickly became apparent that they were making their own decision about whether to bring a coat to school. As in previous newsletters, please ensure your child has some sort of coat or packable jacket every day, whatever the weather was like yesterday, last summer or forecast to be next weekend. If the forecast is predicting rain or it is actually raining as you leave the house, use that as a helpful reminder. There is no such thing as bad weather, just the wrong clothes.

Parentmail

We are moving onto a new platform for school information management and communication. From September 2025, we will be using Arbor for an increasing number of services and stopping Parentmail for comms and payments. Please do not make any payments via Parentmail after 20th July. wrapping a number of services into one provider, the school will make a significant cost saving, as well as having the use of a more advanced platform.

Uniform changes

In our continued efforts to reduce the price of uniform, we have changed our PE t-shirt and tracksuit top for all year groups, and these are now available via the Price & Buckland school website.

If your child already has PE kit, this will remain perfectly acceptable in perpetuity, so there is no need to change. In line with this, second hand or passed down items can still be bought from the pre-loved uniform sales and worn with pride.

Year 4 Visit to Wakehurst Place

On 25th July, Year 4 enjoyed a wonderful trip to Wakehurst Place to support our science learning about living things and their habitats. Working in groups, they investigated different tree species, measured height, girth, and canopy cover, and made careful observations to help estimate each tree's age. No Smartphones in school policy reminder from September 2025

As you know, we do not allow children to bring phones to school unless there are special circumstances and parents make a request to me. From September we will not allow children to bring in smartphones to school under any circumstances.

If you feel that your family have extenuating circumstances, then following a direct request to me, we may allow a non-smartphone (also known as a brick phone – costing around £20) to be brought to school and handed to/collected from the class teacher at the start of each day. These phones cannot have a camera or internet access.

Please note that this supersedes any prior agreement made with any individual family.





Drop off and pick up

You may have seen talk recently about how childhood has changed, with some commenting that modern society has led to less freedom in the 'real world' for current children (think about what age you were allowed out alone and compare that to current thinking), whilst allowing greater access, and potentially less supervision, to the online world. While we, as a school, promote independence in our children, we are always mindful that safety and security should come first. As a result, it is school policy that only children in Year 5 and Year 6 are allowed to walk home on their own, provided that the school and family have no concerns about the child's ability to keep themselves safe and that the school receives permission via our permission form which will be sent out in September.

In order to develop independence in a graduated way, if your child is in Year 4 and you feel they are ready for a little more responsibility, from September, we will allow them to be dropped off at the bottom gate in the morning (after 8:45am) to make their way into school by themselves. They will still need to be collected from the wooden KS2 gate at the end of the day by an adult. Please note that all children in Years R - 3 should be taken to their entrance gate/door each morning and supervised by an adult until the entrance opens at 8:45am.
