## English

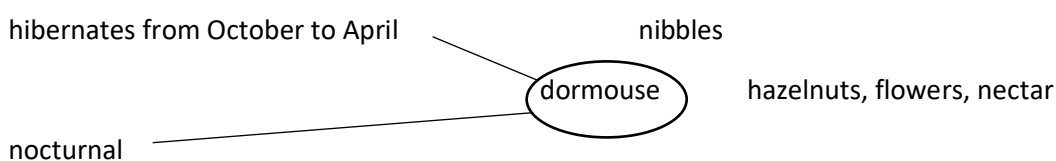
### LO: To find out what a kenning is

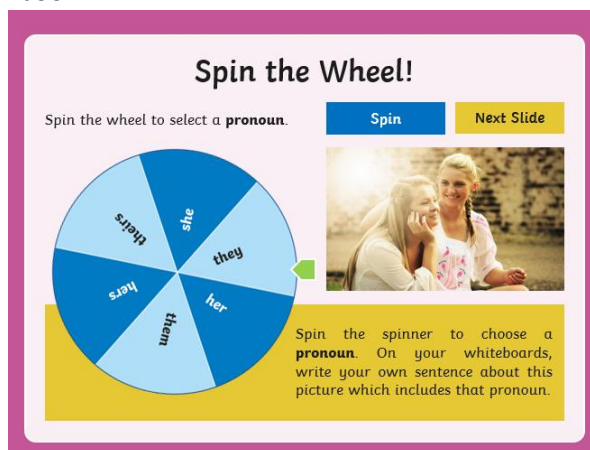
**LO: To investigate personal and possessive pronouns**

You will need to work through the PowerPoint for this activity.

Write a list of personal and possessive pronouns in your Home Learning book. Set it out like this:

Personal pronouns	Possessive pronouns

There are 3 'Spin the Wheel' slides and you will need to write the sentence that you make for each slide, in your book.



Can you see that I have spun the wheel and the pointer has landed on 'they'?

My sentence **must** include this pronoun eg,

They are having a lovely conversation in the sunshine.

**Maths**

**LO: Dividing 2 digit numbers by 10 or Tenths**

Find the web page and listen to the lesson for today.

Then open the activity and complete the questions in your maths book.

**If you are doing the year 4 lesson;**

You will sometimes need to draw a place value chart in your book. Do this neatly using a ruler and following the lines on your page (each box within the grid needs to be 3 squares across and two down). If you get stuck, listen to the lesson again, or look at the answers to help you.

**Optional challenge for all**

Round the dice decimals

Age 7 to 11



There are two dice, each of them with faces labelled from 1 to 6.

When the dice are rolled they can be combined in two different ways to make a number less than 10 with one decimal place.

For example, if I roll a 2 and a 3 I can combine them to make 2.3 or 3.2.

Now round each of these numbers to the nearest whole number: 2.3 rounds to 2 and 3.2 rounds to 3. Repeat for other rolls of the dice.

Do both of the numbers you make ever round to the same whole number?

On the web page there are interactive dice that you can use. You could make it into a game with a partner. Each time you roll the dice, you make a number with one decimal place. Then round this number to the nearest whole number. Who will be the first to make all the numbers from 1 to 7?
