It was lovely to see so many of you at our Sports Day on Tuesday – we could not have asked for better weather. The results were announced to the children in the morning assembly, with Dunorlan winning Track Events and Calverley winning the Field Events. However, the real winner was sport – children running or balancing or jumping as well as they could and cheering on their friends whether they were winning or persevering until the finish line. Thanks to Mrs Dennett and Mrs Naismith for the excellent organisation.

The presentation on Smartphone Free Childhoods on Wednesday evening was well attended – thank you to Erin Carroll for leading and giving us so much to think about. I sincerely hope that this will be the beginning of a movement within St James'. Please see below for more information.

Smartphone Free Childhood meeting

Thank you to everyone who came to join me on Wednesday night, to hear a summary of the research on the impact of smartphones, and discuss some of the challenges and rewards of choosing to delay giving smartphones to our children. The two local mum's experience of their kids thriving in Year 7 without a smartphone were so inspiring, and left most of us feeling like we can make this a reality.





We had a great turn out, and at the time of writing we have had 61 new sign ups to the Parent Pact - that's now 141 in total, a whopping 22% of our school community wanting to make this choice. So it really nearly is a reality!

Looking at each year group, Yr 1 and 2 parents have already far exceeded the numbers needed to dissolve the peer pressure around smartphones as a third of parents have signed up! This is what we are aiming towards - people being able to make the choice they want without a fear it will isolate their children. Reception, Yrs 3, 4 and 5 haven't got much further to go – it's within our grasp.

We recognise the extra challenge that Yr 6 parents face as the peer pressure is already intense by this age, but 13% of kids won't have smartphones as their Yr 5 parents have signed the pact - making it much easier for any of the children to transition to secondary without one. Just a few more of you signing up will make such a difference to the confidence we can all feel in our choice, and the easier it will be on our kids.

If you wanted to come along to the evening but couldn't, the slides from the presentation are attached to this newsletter and have been distributed in your Whatsapp class groups. At the end of the slides is a QR code to join the SFC St James Whatapp group for sharing ideas and supporting each other to make this choice as parents. The Tunbridge Wells SFC group is also active (join via the SFC website), and there was a helpful discussion yesterday evening about the pros and cons of different alternative phones from parents' firsthand experience.

No Smartphones in school policy

As you know, we do not allow children to bring phones to school unless there are special circumstances and parents make a request to me. From September we will not allow children to bring in smartphones to school under any circumstances.

If you feel that your family have extenuating circumstances, then following a direct request to me, we may allow a non-smartphone (also known as a brick phone – costing around £20) to be brought to school and handed to/collected from the class teacher at the start of each day. These phones cannot have a camera or internet access.

Please note that this supersedes any prior agreement made with any individual family.

RAAC update

As you know, the RAAC has been mitigated by the significant work carried out to strengthen the junior roof and the full surveys that are conducted three times per year to ensure the work remains effective.





I wrote to you last year, when we were given a timetable for how our RAAC issues would be addressed in the longer term. As a phase 2 school we were told that a project manager would be appointed by April 2025 with surveys and planning work started in the summer.

So far we have heard nothing and our DfE contact has no further news for us. I will of course update you as soon as we have any updates.
