

Extra: Try a different number of your choice. Extra: Write some stories that have 15 as the answer. Examples: The farmer had 5 pigs, 2 cows and then he bought 4 sheep at the market. The next morning one of his pigs had 4 piglets. He had 15 animals altogether. The farmer's chickens laid 24 eggs. His family ate 9 for breakfast. How many did he have left?	Make 50p from silver coins. You can use 5p coins, 10p coins, 20p coins and a 50p. See if you can find all the ways. Which way uses the least coins? Which way uses the most coins? If this is too tricky then try making 20p with silver coins. You can use 5p, 10p and a 20p. See if you can find all the ways. Extra: Make 1 pound with 10p, 20p and 50p coins. How many ways can you find? Can you do it in order from least coins to most coins? If you do use real coins, make sure you wash your hands really well afterwards, as coins are not clean!

Geography	The Jolly Postman visited many fairy-tale homes. Make a map of his journey showing the different houses and/or people he visited. Can you compass points (North, South, East and West) to your map?			
Art	Romans made mosaics . A mosaic is a picture or pattern made of small tiles arranged neatly in rows. Cut up some small squares of paper. They could be bright colours if you have them. Arrange them into a Spring or Easter picture or pattern. Do not leave any spaces. Stick them down. If you do not have any glue then try stirring a spoonful of flour with a little water. This was the glue that the children had to use during the war!			
DT	Design an Easter or Spring card. It could be a chick popping out of an egg. It could be lambs skipping across a field.
